

### 2014 DSAP Open Space Concept

Distributed spaces interconnected with walkways and paseos



- Los Gatos Creek Trail and Guadalupe
   River Trail as green spine (#1 on figure
   to left)
- Former Fire Training Station as multiacre park (#2 on figure to left)
- Civic Plaza East of Diridon Station (#4 on figure to left)
- Series of Neighborhood Squares (#5's on figure to left)
- Interconnections provided via pedestrian walkways



#### **Projecting the Need for Parks and Recreation Facilities**

- Goal: Three acres of open space per 1,000 new residents (refer to SJMC 14.26 and 19.38 and Envision 2040)
- Assumptions for planning purposes
  - 75% high-rise, 25% mid-rise
  - No credits included in assumptions (i.e. affordable housing or private recreation)

Parkland Goal	62 acres or Equivalent Recreation Amenities



### **Options for Meeting the Parkland Goal**

- Land Dedication: Developer deeds land to the City for construction of new park space
- Recreation Improvements: Developer builds recreation infrastructure; can be at parks or community centers
- In-Lieu Fee: Developer pays fee in accordance with fee schedule established in City Council Resolution 78474 (adopted 12/19/17)
- Any combination of the three options noted above



# **Current Thinking about the DSAP**

- ActivateSJ Guides decisions and priorities
  - Stewardship, Nature, Equity and Access, Identity, Public Life
- PRNS Priorities for the Diridon Station Area
  - Complete the Los Gatos Creek Trail as Paved Off-Road Corridor
  - Providing community programming spaces
  - Creating new parks and open space
    - Enhancing connectivity through small, interconnected spaces
  - Maintaining and activating trails and parks

## **Key Community Center Services**

- Fitness centers and gymnasiums
- Preschool programs
- After school programs and summer camps focused on arts, dance, and exercise
- Teen Center programs focused on leadership development, digital and media arts, field trips and sports
- Community meeting space and additional classroom spaces



### **Steps Forward**

- Evaluate ownership, operations and maintenance models
- Consider park design elements proposed by Google
- Identify opportunities for activation and programming
